


Examples of written academic texts

Can you identify expressions that indicate whether the intention of the author(s) was to describe, sequence, compare, discuss cause & effect or present problems & solutions?

The texts are taken from academic journals so you can expect the language to be complex in parts, but you can apply skills discussed in previous steps to approach these extracts.

Reply to the question and share any other relevant **Comments** you wish to make inside the **Padlet**. Only comments relating to a particular text will be shown underneath that text.
